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Barnes Literary Society Annual Report for the year ended 31 July 2023

Our opening speaker for 2022/23 was scheduled to be Jeremy Hunt, the UK's longest serving Secretary of State for Health. Jeremy was to talk about his book *Zero: Eliminating Unnecessary Deaths in a Post-Pandemic NHS*. However the Friday before the Tuesday event Jeremy was promoted to Chancellor of Exchequer and was, understandably, no longer able to come to Barnes. We were very grateful that Chris Blackhurst, an award-winning business writer and commentator, kindly offered to step in and talk about his book *Too Big to Jail*. Chris gave us a fascinating insight into the greatest banking scandal of the century, involving HSBC and the Mexican drug cartels.

In November, we welcomed Jane Garvey of Fortunately... with Fi and Jane fame. Jane was interviewed by Harriett Gilbert about the duo's book did I say that out loud? : notes on the chuff of life. It was a delightfully entertaining conversation and we got to learn much about the many different aspects of Jane's life at the BBC and more lately Times Radio. The event also registered as our largest audience since the Covid lockdown. January brought another wonderfully lively event. Chibundu Onuzo not only discussed her latest novel Sankofa, set in the fictional African state of Bamana, but also entertained us with the musical single she wrote to accompany the book. Chibundu encouraged everybody to sing along creating the perfect antidote to a grim January evening.

In February, we changed tack completely when scientists Anil Seth and Adam Rutherford came to talk about Anil's book on consciousness, *Being You*. We were treated to a fascinating and intellectually stimulating discussion about a new understanding of consciousness and the concept of 'self'. March brought a return to fiction. Elizabeth Buchan joined Harriett Gilbert on stage to talk about her latest novel *Two Women in Rome*; and in May we welcomed Charles Cumming who discussed the second book in his thriller series surrounding BOX 88, *Judas 62*, with our Events Secretary Sue Pandit.

We were delighted to be able to host a literary outing in April, our first outing since the Covid lockdowns. We enjoyed a very informative tour of the Stationers' Company, learning a great deal about one of the first livery companies to be established in London.

Our summer event was slightly different, this year. To help us all get to know one another a little better we offered summer drinks followed by a talk. This allowed an hour of mingling, with drinks and canapes in the church, before sitting down to listen to Natalie Haynes talk about her latest novel, *Medusa*.

Membership figures for this season returned to pre-Covid levels. We reached 395. (Current membership for this season, 23/24, is 360.)

Our single membership fee remained at £30 equating to £5 a talk. This continues to offer excellent value for money when other local book festivals can charge upwards of £15 per talk. The 23/24 season has seen us continue with a subscription fee of £30 per single membership.

There are a number of people I would like to thank.

We are very lucky to have such supportive patrons at the BLS and I would like to say a big thank you to all of them. I would also like to thank our amazing trustees. They give up a great deal of their time to enable the high-quality events of the BLS.

I would like to thank Sarah Arthur for including us in the *Barnes Bugle*; the Barnes Community Association (BCA) for providing coverage of our events in their online monthly magazine, *Prospect Plus*; *Arts Richmond* for their coverage; and all of the local shops, businesses, libraries and organisations which take our publicity.

I would also like to thank St Mary's for allowing us to use the church's excellent facilities.

I would like to comment briefly on the Treasurer's report on income and expenditure, attached below. This account has been prepared on a cash basis in line with the requirements of the Charity Commission and has been submitted to the Charity Commission as required as part of the Annual Return. We delivered a surplus of £4,730 compared to the previous year's surplus of £4,522. Reserves at 31 July 2022 were £32,655, represented by cash at the bank.

Strong reserves meant that we were able to bestow a number of grants this season: Mortlake Community Association – we provided books for the Christmas Santa's Grotto event and for an adult literacy course

Arts Richmond – we gave funds to film the Young People's Writing Competition Festival afternoon and to provide prizes for the competition

AfC Richmond – we funded a book group for children in care/care leavers Lowther School – we provided funds towards the school library.

Our financial position, today, remains strong with a large membership and members able to gift aid their subscription. This means we can continue to fund literary opportunities such as the creative writing course that began in October this year. We have received a number of new applications from people requesting funding this 23/24 season and look forward to continuing to promote, and provide opportunities for, the appreciation and understanding of literature in our borough.
